






RESULTS FROM A NATIONALLY REPRESENTATIVE SURVEY OF YOUNG PEOPLE AGE 18-30 TAKEN AUGUST 1-14...

- African Americans, Asian Americans, and Latino/as are more likely to vote for Hillary Clinton than Donald Trump while whites are split
- African Americans strongly favor Clinton to Trump (60 percent vs. 2 percent) as do Asian Americans (52 percent vs. 14 percent) and Latino/as (49 percent vs. 8 percent)
- Whites are split between the candidates (28 percent vs. 28 percent)
- Overall, more young people would vote for Clinton (39 percent) than Trump (19 percent)

% who would vote for...




Question: If the general election were held today, and the candidates were Hillary Clinton for the Democrats, Donald Trump for the Republicans, Gary Johnson for the Libertarian Party, and Jill Stein for the Green Party, for whom would you vote?

- Clinton has yet to gain the support of many young people, especially whites, who previously backed Bernie Sanders
- Among Sanders supporters, only 60 percent of Asian Americans, 55 percent of African Americans, 47 percent of Latino/as, and 39 percent of whites plan to vote for Clinton
- Many young people, especially Latino/as, are uncertain if they will vote in November
- Forty-six percent of Latino/as are uncertain or unlikely to vote in November compared with 38 percent of African Americans, 36 percent of Asian Americans, and 31 percent of whites

- The vice presidential candidates for the two major parties are not well known to most young people of all races and ethnicities and are unlikely to affect their vote
- At least 2 in 3 young people in each racial and ethnic group do not think the selection of Mike Pence or Tim Kaine will impact their vote
- Majorities of all races and ethnicities say they do not know enough about Pence or Kaine to have an opinion of them

Questions: For each of the following individuals, please select if you have a favorable or unfavorable impression of that person. If you don't know enough about the person to have an opinion, you can say that too. [Mike Pence] [Tim Kaine]

- Among all racial and ethnic groups, racism is frequently identified as one of the most important problems facing the country
- Racism is cited as one of the three most important problems by 40 percent of African Americans, 29 percent of Asian Americans and Latino/as, and 22 percent of whites
- Police brutality is the most cited problem by African Americans (42 percent), gun control is most cited by Asian Americans (35 percent), immigration is most cited by Latino/as (36 percent), and terrorism and homeland security is most cited by whites (30 percent)
