




RESULTS FROM A NATIONALLY REPRESENTATIVE SURVEY OF YOUNG PEOPLE AGE 18-30 TAKEN JULY 9-20...

- ✓ **African Americans and Latino/as are more likely than whites or Asian Americans to have had experience with gun violence in the last year**
 - Thirty-seven percent of African Americans and 24 percent of Latino/as report they or someone they know has experienced gun violence compared with 12 percent of whites and Asian Americans
- ✓ **Majorities of young African Americans, Asian Americans, and Latino/as prioritize gun control over gun rights while a majority of whites favor protecting gun rights**
 - Seventy-six percent of Asian Americans, 63 percent of African Americans, and 60 percent of Latino/as say it is more important to control guns than protect gun rights while 53 percent of whites favor gun rights
- ✓ **There is broad support across races and ethnicities for policies aimed at reducing gun violence**
 - Majorities of all racial and ethnic groups do not believe laws limiting gun ownership infringe on the public's right to bear arms
 - Criminal background checks receive support from 9 in 10 young people of all races and ethnicities while a ban on semi-automatic weapons receives lower but still majority support across all racial and ethnic groups

% of all young adults age 18-30 who support...



- ✓ **Among young people, Asian Americans are particularly concerned about the dangers of gun ownership**
 - Asian Americans are more likely to say owning a gun puts people's safety at risk (62 percent) than African Americans (46 percent), Latino/as (39 percent), and whites (34 percent)
- ✓ **Race shapes how young people interpret recent mass shootings in the United States**
 - Asian Americans, Latino/as, and whites are more likely to view the June 2016 shooting at the Florida nightclub as terrorism than say the same about the June 2015 shooting at a South Carolina church

- ✓ **There is widespread opposition to banning Muslims from entering the United States, especially among African Americans and Asian Americans**
 - Seventy-nine percent of African Americans and Asian Americans oppose temporarily banning Muslims from entering the United States compared with 66 percent of Latino/as and 64 percent of whites
- ✓ **Young African Americans, Asian Americans, and Latino/as are more concerned than whites about the threat of violence from white extremists**
 - Most young people across all races and ethnicities are concerned about the threat of violence from U.S. residents inspired by foreign extremists and non-U.S. residents
 - About 8 in 10 African Americans, Asian Americans, and Latino/as are concerned about violence from white extremists compared with 7 in 10 whites
