

RESULTS FROM GENFORWARD -- A NATIONALLY REPRESENTATIVE SURVEY OF YOUNG PEOPLE AGE 18-30 TAKEN OCTOBER 1-14 BY THE BLACK YOUTH PROJECT WITH THE AP-NORC CENTER...

✓ Support for Hillary Clinton among young whites has risen sharply in the last month

- Among all young whites, Clinton holds a large lead over Trump (35 percent vs. 21 percent), which is a significant change from last month when both candidates had support from 27 percent of young whites
- Clinton also has a significant lead over Trump among young whites likely to vote (51 percent vs. 23 percent)

✓ African Americans, Asian Americans, and Latino/as continue to favor Hillary Clinton over Donald Trump


- Clinton leads Trump among young African Americans, (59 percent vs. 4 percent), Asian Americans (52 percent vs. 15 percent), and Latino/as (44 percent vs. 8 percent)
- Among likely voters, Clinton leads with African Americans, (76 percent vs. 3 percent), Asian Americans (74 percent vs. 9 percent), and Latino/as (57 percent vs. 13 percent)

✓ Hillary Clinton has support from a similar percent of young voters as Barack Obama won in 2012, but Clinton's coalition includes more whites and less people of color

- When including those leaning towards a candidate, Clinton receives support from 60 percent of young likely voters, which matches Obama's vote total from 2012
- In comparison to Obama in 2012, Clinton is receiving more support from young whites, and somewhat less support, although still a majority, from young African Americans, Asian Americans, and Latino/as

% voted for Obama in 2012/likely voters who support Clinton




Question: If the general election were held today, and the candidates were Hillary Clinton for the Democrats, Donald Trump for the Republicans, Gary Johnson for the Libertarian Party, and Jill Stein for the Green Party, for whom would you vote?

✓ There is little evidence of a gender gap among young people of any race or ethnicity when it comes to the presidential candidates

- Across races and ethnicities, Clinton and Trump receive similar levels of support from men and women

Clinton receives similar support from men and women

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✓ Support for third-party candidates remains relatively low, and most of the support comes from young whites

- Gary Johnson receives support from 15 percent of whites, 7 percent of Latino/as, 5 percent of Asian Americans, and 2 percent of African Americans
- Jill Stein receives support from 4 percent of whites, 4 percent of Asian Americans, 3 percent of Latino/as, and 3 percent of African Americans

✓ Few young people plan to vote for a different party for Congress than for President

- Among likely voters, majorities of African Americans (77 percent), Asian Americans (76 percent) and Latino/as (57 percent) as well as half of whites (50 percent) plan to vote for the Democratic Party's candidate for Congress
- More than 9 in 10 likely voters of all races and ethnicities say they plan to vote for the same party in Congressional elections as the Presidential race
