

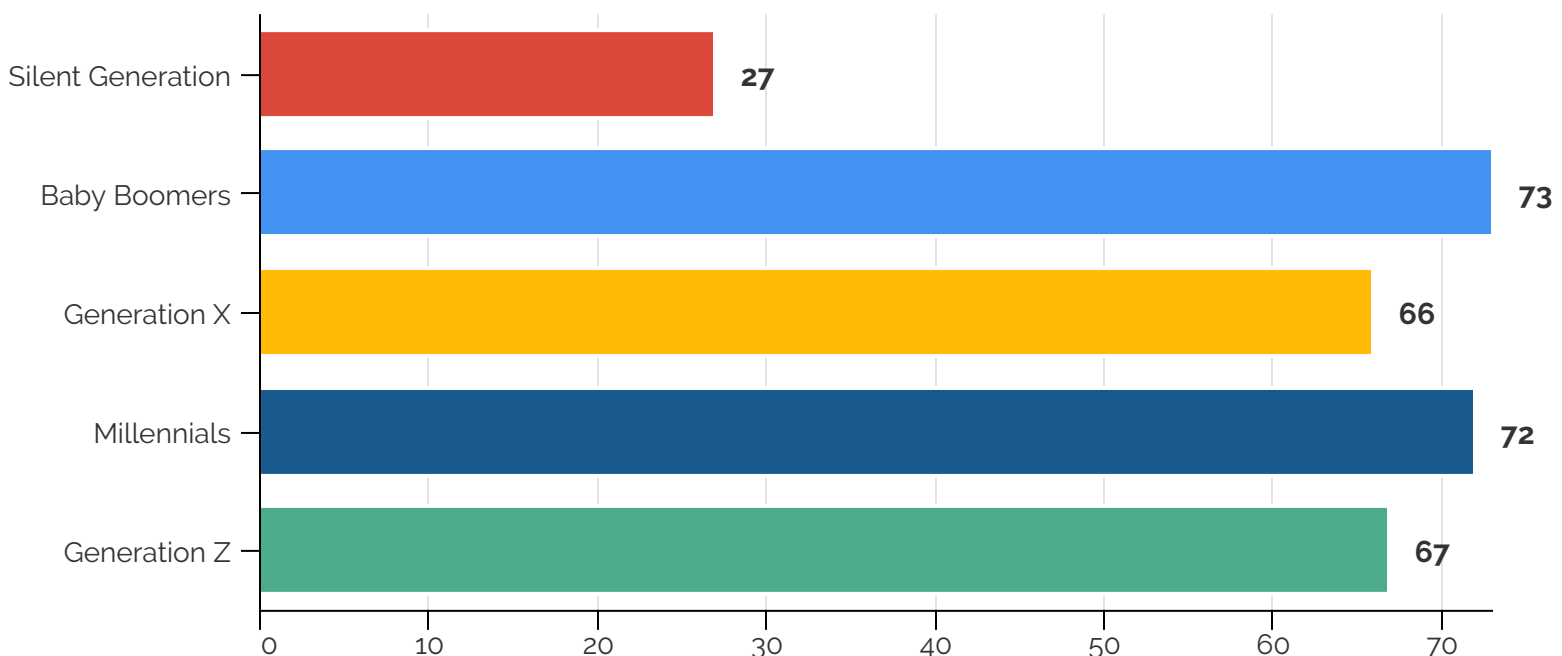
Generation Z:

Also deemed "Post-Millennials," Generation Z is known for having grown up in the ever-changing digital era. With the oldest of them just graduating college, Here are a few things to know about them.

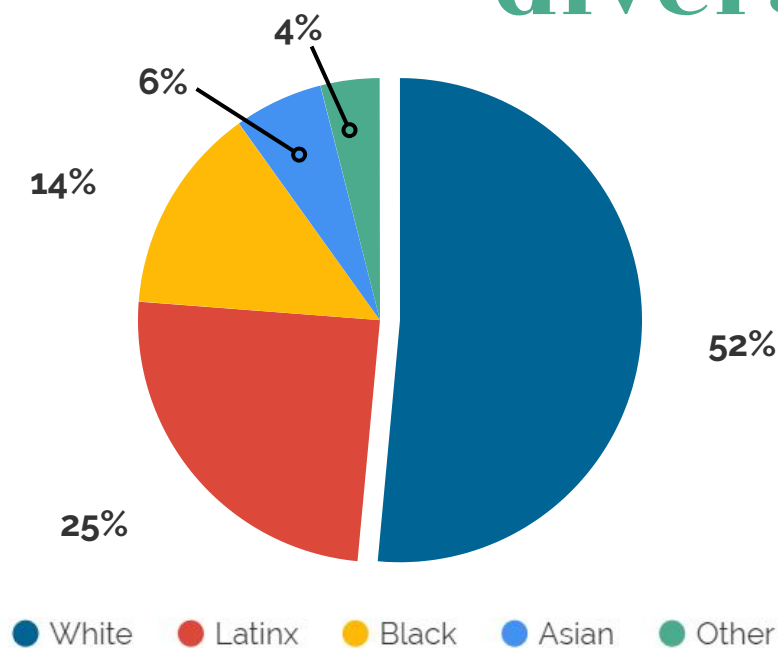
Though there are several ways to define the generation, here we will align ourselves with Pew Research Center in using **1997 and 2012 (ages 7-22) as our birthyear cutoffs.

U.S. Population in 2018, in millions

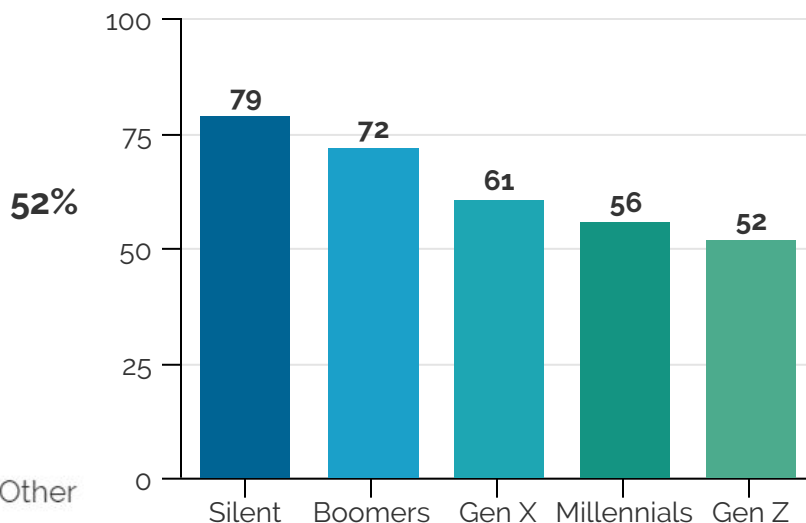


They are currently around **66.5 million** in number. For comparison, there were around 65.4 million millennials in 2002. Generation Z is expected to continue growing as immigration adds to their numbers.¹

...and are already **the most diverse** generation yet.²

Only a **bare majority** of Generation Z is white, and this unprecedented diversity is reflected in the U.S. general population's gradual diversification.

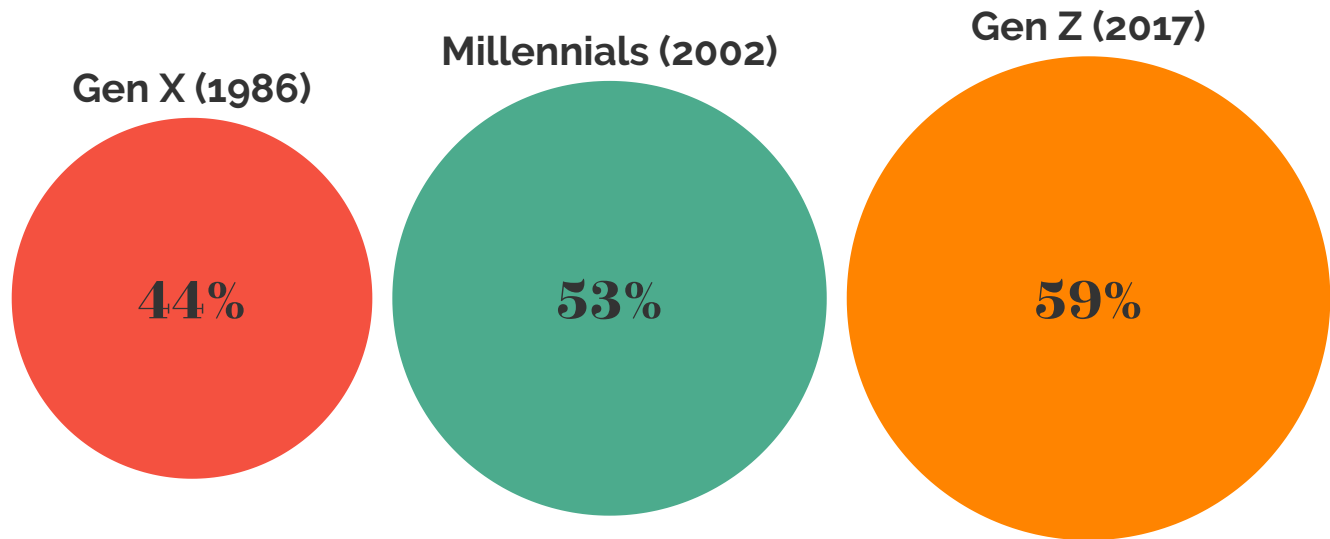

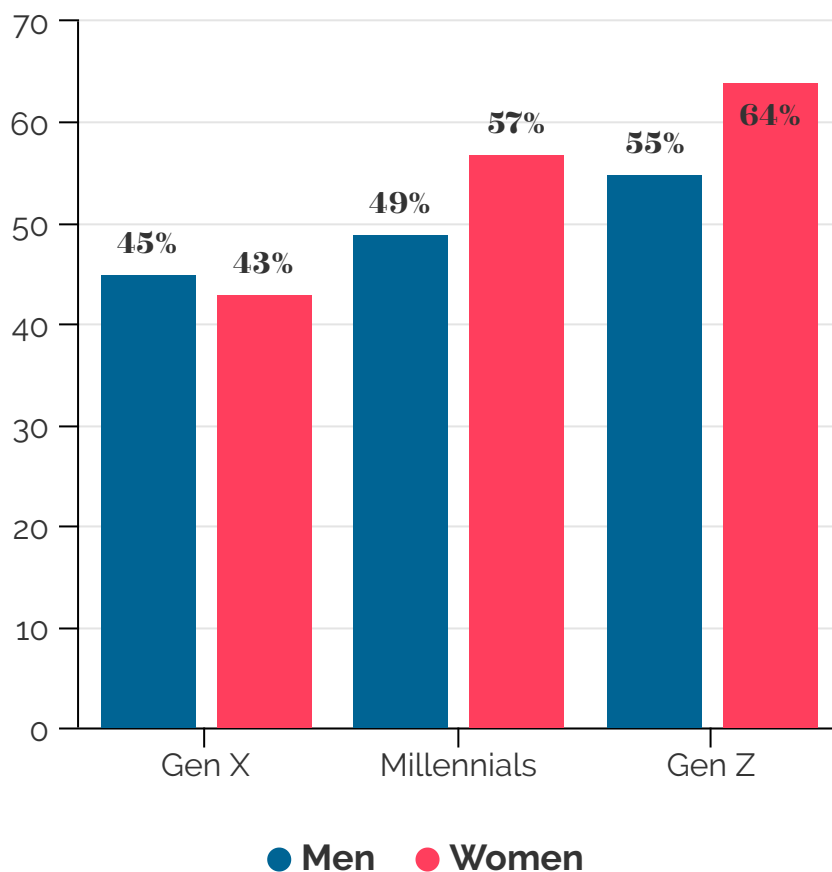
Gen Zers are of Latinx descent, a **larger proportion** than any previous generation.³

They are also on track to becoming the **best educated** generation yet.

College enrollment rates among young adults continue to **rise with each new generation.**

This upward trend is especially notable among the **young women of Gen Z**, of which **nearly two-thirds** are enrolled in college.

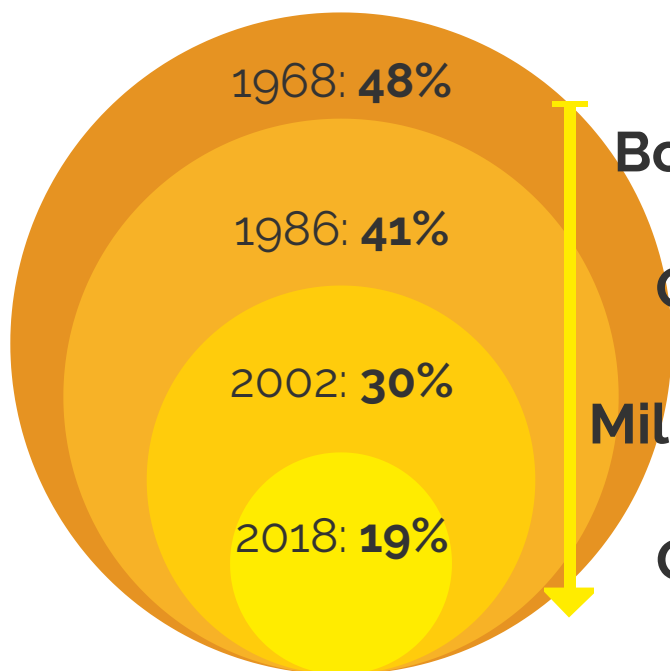
They are just beginning to **enter the workforce**, and will keep making waves as they continue to do so.



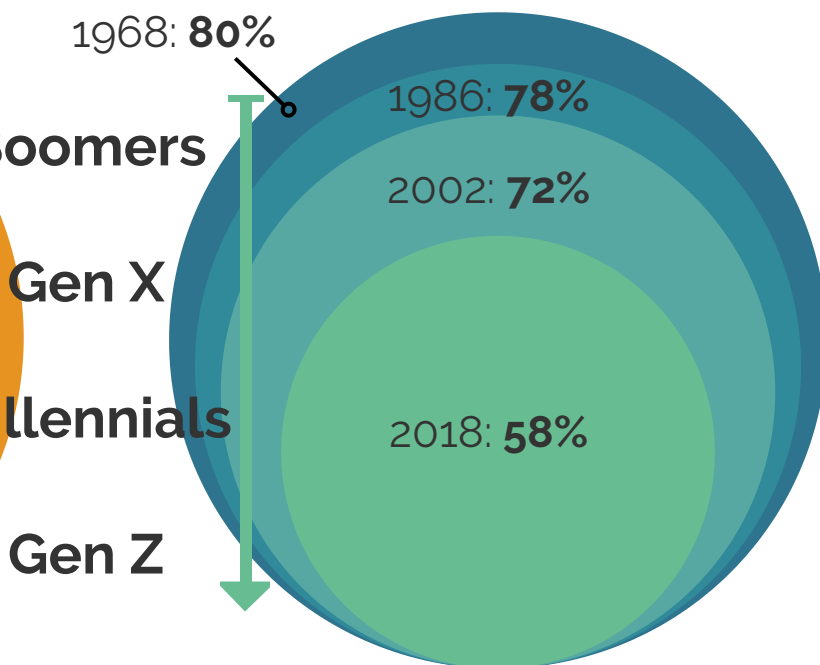
30% of the labor force will be Generation Zers by 2030.⁶

However, young adult **employment rates are down**, relative to previous generations.⁷

Generation Z is projected to become the **largest generation of consumers** by 2020, and already hold

\$44 billion

in estimated buying power.⁸



Though GenZ is only just entering adulthood, they already have **high aspirations:**

of young adults (18-23)

report to be planning to buy a house within the next 5 years.⁹

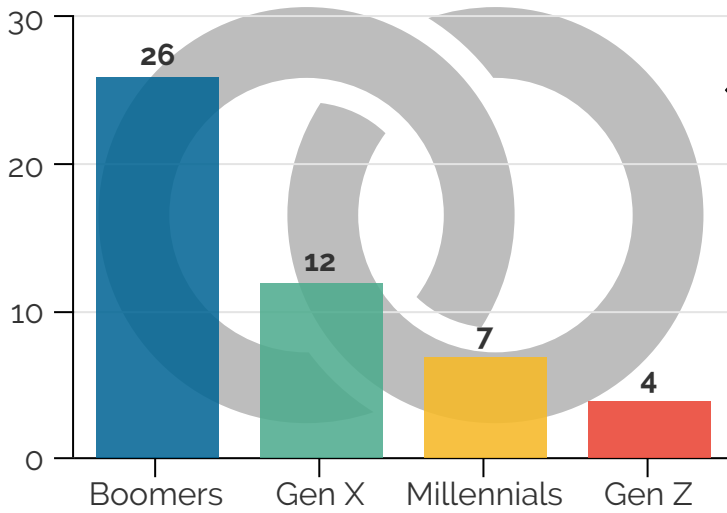

At the same time, 50% of Gen Zers report not being willing to take more than \$10,000 just in student debt.

Yet the **average student loan balance** for Gen Zers is already **\$11,380**, a figure that will only continue to climb as more of them age and progress through college.¹¹

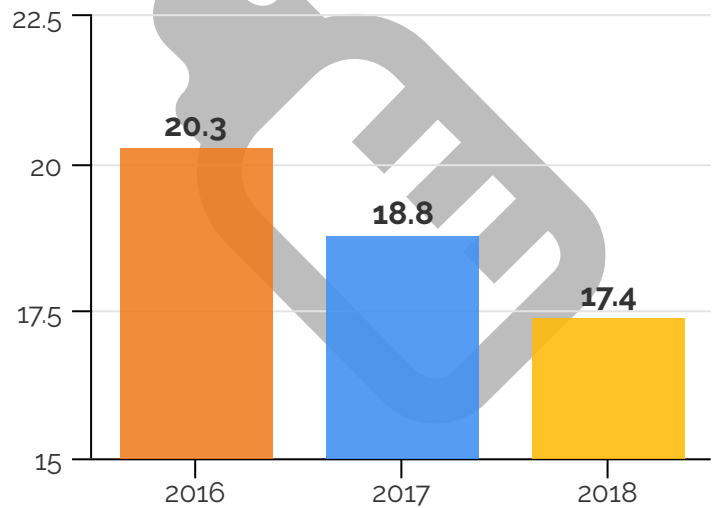
% Married 18 to 21 year-olds, by generation



Young adults are **getting married later and later**, with marriage rates among 18 to 21 year-olds at an all time low.¹²

Teen **birth rates** have also **been declining for years**; Gen Z is no exception.¹³

America's adult **LGBTQ+** population has been steadily rising, no doubt in part due to Generation Z.

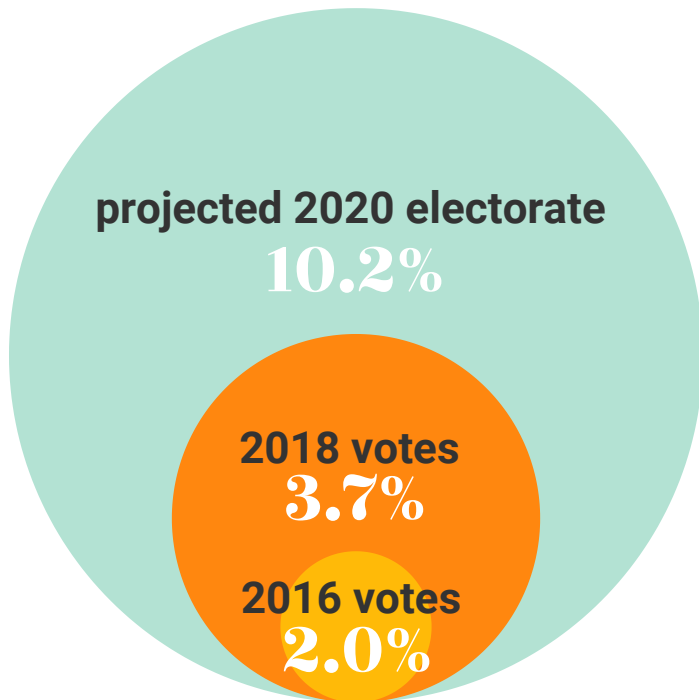
They are also **changing the conversation surrounding gender identity**. Roughly **33%** of Gen Zers know someone who uses **gender neutral pronouns**. To compare, this number is 25% for millennials, and even lower for preceding generations.¹⁵

Only 66% of people between ages 16 and 22

label themselves as [exclusively heterosexual]¹⁴

As more members of Generation Z gradually **reach voting age**, they become an increasingly important demographic in the electorate.¹⁶

When the oldest of them were just 19, Generation Z cast **2.7 million votes**, making up **2.0%** of all votes in the 2016 election.

In 2018, this number rose to **4.5 million**, lending them a **30% turnout** and **3.7%** of all votes.

They are projected to represent **10.2% of the 2020 electorate**.

Generation Z, Millennials, and Generation X outvoted previous generations (Baby Boomers and older) in both 2016 and 2018.¹⁸

This shift in the electorate will only become more prominent as more Gen Zers reach legal voting age.



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
